At the same time, we are expanding equitable access so that all students can participate in international learning. New initiatives like the Maida Education Abroad Grants ensure that financial need is not a barrier, while programs like Passport to Success help first-generation and high-need students take their first steps toward global opportunities. These efforts strengthen our commitment to ensuring that international experiences are not limited to a few, but accessible to every student, regardless of background.

This work is possible because of the extraordinary people who make up our global community: our students, faculty, staff, and partners around the world. Their accomplishments, from faculty leading groundbreaking research collaborations to students advocating for justice on the global stage, are the heartbeat of this report. By deepening international partnerships, advancing new research collaborations, and extending Lehigh's global expertise to support both our campus and our community, we are expanding the resources that drive discovery and dissemination of knowledge worldwide.

As you read these pages, I invite you to see how OIA is shaping the university, the community, and the world. It is a privilege to share these stories with you, and to celebrate the people who make them possible.


Lehigh Strategic Plan

### Lehigh Welcomes Large International Cohort

Lehigh's global community continues to thrive. The university welcomed **989 international students from 91 countries and 140 visiting scholars from 42 countries in 2023–24**. These numbers nearly return to pre-pandemic levels and underscore Lehigh's strength as a destination for top students and scholars worldwide.



These gains reflect both national and state-level trends. International student enrollment in the U.S. surpassed 1.1 million in 2023–24, the highest since records began in 1948, while Pennsylvania institutions hosted more than 50,000 international students, contributing \$2.2 billion to the state economy and supporting nearly 22,000 jobs. Lehigh's enrollment places it firmly within this resurgence, demonstrating its leadership in global higher education and its role in fostering international collaboration.

In 2024, Lehigh's international students generated an estimated \$62.3 million in economic impact and supported 690 local jobs, according to NAFSA: Association of International Educators. This connection between global reach and local impact reflects Lehigh's identity as an anchor institution, one that advances education, innovation, and opportunity both on campus and beyond.

Cheryl Matherly wrote about this approach in NAFSA's Trends & Insights, exploring how universities are redefining internationalization to benefit their local communities as well as the world.




### Supporting International Students

Lehigh has remained steadfast in its commitment to international students and scholars, who are essential to the vitality of the university community. The university has prioritized clear, consistent communication and provided timely guidance to help students navigate changes in immigration and visa policy.

At the heart of this work is the Office of International Students and Scholars (OISS), which connects students with resources, advocates on their behalf, and ensures that international students feel welcomed and supported throughout their Lehigh experience.

Additionally, as part of the resources available to Lehigh's international community, the International Center for Academic and Professional English (ICAPE) offers programs that help multilingual students strengthen their English communication skills and succeed academically and professionally.



### President Helble Highlights Importance of a Global Community



In his 2024-25 commencement address, President Joseph J. Helble '82 <u>underscored the vital role</u> international students play in shaping Lehigh's identity as a globally engaged academic community.

Nearly 30% of graduate students and 45% of Ph.D. recipients in the Class of 2025 were international, representing 39 countries. Helble praised this diversity as central to the university's mission, reminding graduates that "a university has brought you together from around the globe" at a time when the wider world is often divided.

"Global educational communities are, in my view, the very definition of an American research university, an American learning university. To our graduating students, regardless of your degree or program, I'd ask you to think about what you have learned from those around you, from that geographically diverse global coalition of learners and scholars."

### International Student Advisory Board

Launched in 2024, the <u>International Student Advisory Board</u> gives international students a voice in shaping their Lehigh experience. Comprised of undergraduate and graduate students from around the world, ISAB provides feedback and recommendations to the Office of International Students and Scholars (OISS) on programs, services, and support. The board fosters community, amplifies student perspectives, and helps ensure that international students feel valued and connected at Lehigh.

### A Global Student's Path to Leadership



Akari Takahashi '24 began her Lehigh journey thousands of miles away in Japan, enrolling in the Virtual College Success Academy during the COVID-19 pandemic. Navigating time zone challenges and adapting to a new academic culture, she found support through the International Center for Academic and Professional English (ICAPE), which helps multilingual students strengthen communication skills and connect with campus resources. With that foundation, Akari embraced leadership opportunities, serving as president of Voices student magazine and mentoring peers. She credits ICAPE and the Lehigh community for helping her grow into a confident leader, experiences she now carries with her to medical school.

### OIA Hosts Renowned Global Education Leader



### Coaching and Critical Intercultural Learning: A New Approach for Global Education





Lehigh University is advancing a <u>new model of global learning</u> that places coaching at the center of intercultural development. This approach views coaching as a reflective, evidence-based practice that helps students and professionals cultivate self-awareness, empathy, and the ability to navigate complexity across cultures. By integrating coaching into its global learning strategy, Lehigh seeks to empower individuals to engage more thoughtfully in creating a more equitable and sustainable world.

This vision is being shaped by the work of Angelina Rodríguez, Assistant Vice Provost for Global Learning, who developed a pedagogical coaching model that blends intercultural understanding with transformational learning and aligns with the university's broader strategic goals.

In April 2024, Lehigh brought this framework to a national audience by hosting an AIEA Thematic Forum titled "Coaching and Critical Intercultural Learning: Towards a New Approach for Global Education." The two-day event drew more than three dozen educators and international leaders to campus, highlighting coaching as a powerful tool for advancing intercultural learning and global education.

Forum participants examined coaching and leadership in global contexts, critical intercultural learning outcomes, and distinctions between global and intercultural learning. Guest speakers included Darla Deardorff (UNESCO Chair, Stellenbosch University), Christopher Glass (Boston College), Miriam Meima (Every Day Leader), Lesley Robinson (Ayana), and Dawn Whitehead (AAC&U).

By convening this national dialogue and piloting its own coaching programs, Lehigh is positioning coaching as a distinctive and enduring element of its approach to preparing students as global learners and leaders.

### Global Teaching and Learning Fellows in Guanajuato

Lehigh's Global Teaching and Learning Fellowship (GTLF) continues to expand its impact, sending faculty to Guanajuato, Mexico for immersive seminars in 2024 and 2025. The interdisciplinary program invites educators to reflect on how they "show up" in unfamiliar contexts—balancing their own perspectives with those of students and local communities to create meaningful, place-based learning experiences.

Through workshops, site visits, and shared meals with local families, fellows explore intercultural learning, disciplinary approaches to teaching in context, and strategies for preparing students as global citizens. Developed by Angelina Rodríguez, the fellowship encourages participants to consider the next evolution of their teaching practice and to engage more thoughtfully with difference. Funded by the Farrington Fund, GTLF continues to build a network of faculty committed to advancing global learning across Lehigh's colleges.

### Lee Iacocca Institute for Global Leadership

The lacocca Institute has entered a new chapter as the newly-renamed Lee lacocca Institute for Global Leadership, sharpening its focus on preparing the next generation of culturally agile, globally minded leaders. Established in 1988 to honor the vision of Lee lacocca 45, the Institute is evolving into a year-round, dynamic hub for leadership development, thought leadership, and innovation.

Today, the Institute is advancing a more dynamic model of global leadership education—one that blends immersive experiences, digital platforms, and sustained engagement. Its mission is to make leadership development accessible to all Lehigh students while also offering advanced pathways for students to deepen their leadership skills and global competencies. Guided by feedback from alumni, students, and other stakeholders—including insights from a new student advisory board—the Institute is embedding leadership development across its programs and positioning itself as a space for critical conversations about the future of leadership.

Looking forward, the Institute is expanding its impact through innovative approaches to experiential learning, reimagining internships to reflect the realities of a changing workplace, and deepening its global reach through partnerships with universities, organizations, and businesses worldwide. By integrating career readiness, leadership training, and global collaboration, the Institute is positioning itself as a space where students, faculty, and partners can engage with the most pressing guestions of leadership in the 21st century.

### A Distinguished Network of Global Leaders

In 2024, the Lee lacocca Institute for Global Leadership launched the lacocca Institute Executive Fellows, a distinguished network of business leaders, educators, and multidisciplinary experts who bring real-world perspectives to the Institute's work. Through regular engagement, the Fellows provide insights on global trends, share best practices, and spark cross-disciplinary dialogue that enriches the Institute's programs. # Expanding Horizons with the Iacocca International Internship Program



Since its launch in 2011, the lacocca International Internship Program (IIIP) has provided nearly 900 Lehigh students with high-quality summer internships in more than 60 countries. Each placement gives students the chance to gain hands-on professional experience while developing the intercultural agility and leadership skills that define the Institute's mission.

In 2025, IIIP reached a new milestone with more students interning in Asia than in any other region, reflecting the program's growing focus on dynamic, innovation-driven economies. Through support from the Freeman Foundation and a new partnership with the Global Career Center, Lehigh students secured internships in Singapore, Japan, and other countries across the region, working in sectors such as healthcare, marketing, and technology. Beyond professional training, these experiences fostered cultural fluency and global connections that will serve students throughout their careers.

Looking ahead, the Institute is committed to reimagining internships to reflect the realities of a changing workplace. New leadership and strategic partnerships are shaping opportunities that connect students to emerging fields, diverse pathways, and the competencies needed for career readiness in a global context. By expanding access and strengthening impact, the program continues to prepare Lehigh students to thrive as globally minded leaders.

### Leadership Development in Action

Beyond internships, a wide range of lacocca Institute programs and partnerships give students and participants opportunities to practice leadership, build entrepreneurial skills, and engage with peers from around the world. Below are just a few examples.

- More than 90 alumni from 47 countries <u>participated</u> in the Global Village on the Move program in November 2024, a seven-week experience culminating in a capstone week in Istanbul. Through virtual collaboration, on-site visits, and design simulations, they tackled real-world challenges and strengthened their leadership, innovation, and cross-cultural communication skills in a truly global setting.
- Each summer, globally minded high school students join the fourweek lacocca Global Entrepreneurship Intensive (IGEI). Now in its 23rd year, the program hosted 45 learners this year and has welcomed more than 1,400 alumni from 66 countries since its inception. The program combines experiential learning and intercultural exchange, helping emerging leaders strengthen skills in entrepreneurship, leadership, and global citizenship.
- Twelve German students from the Transatlantic Ruhr Fellowship
   <u>visited Lehigh</u> in summer 2024, participating in leadership courses,
   entrepreneurship workshops, and seminars at the Institute and elsewhere on campus. Part of Lehigh's long-standing partnership with
   UA Ruhr, the program combines classroom learning with company
   visits and cultural experiences.
- The Institute and Lehigh's College of Business collaborated to offer a series of one-credit courses designed to build leadership skills for undergraduates. Current offerings include Becoming a Leader and Leadership in Practice, with a third course on global and community leadership also in development, complementing modules taught in other lacocca programs.

### Executive Fellows Dialogues Highlight Global Leadership in Action

The lacocca Institute Executive Fellows participate in ongoing Executive Fellows Dialogues, which bring together leaders from diverse fields to exchange ideas on global leadership and innovation. One session included Mark Speicher, Senior Vice President of Research, Learning & Innovation at the American Association of Colleges of Osteopathic Medicine (AACOM), discussing global health care systems and patient safety. Another featured Larry Starr, Adjunct Assistant Professor of Pharmacy Systems Science at Geisinger Commonwealth School of Medicine, exploring systemic thinking as a framework for addressing complex challenges.

### Study Abroad at Lehigh

Interest in studying abroad has <u>rebounded strongly since the pandemic</u>, with Lehigh now exceeding its pre-COVID record participation. This growth underscoring the university's strong commitment to global engagement. It also mirrors national trends, where study abroad increased 48% in 2022–23, reflecting a strong recovery in international education.

### Immersive Learning in Santiago



Lehigh Launch Chile offers first-year students a semester of immersive study in Santiago and surrounding regions, combining coursework in social science, Spanish, and natural science with cultural experiences like homestays, national celebrations, and community-based projects. Students earn 16 credits through integrated classes—such as Race and Ethnicity in Latin America—while exploring places like Valparaíso and Chiloé. Directed by sociology professor Hugo Cerón-Anaya, the program fosters academic growth, cultural competency, and global perspectives, while also opening research opportunities for faculty collaboration in Chile and beyond.

### Hands-On Health Learning Abroad

When Lauryn Jones '25 studied abroad in London in 2024, she not only took a variety of courses and immersed herself in the city's culture, but also gained hands-on experience working at Centre 404, a charity for children and adults with learning disabilities. Her service-based learning placement was part of Lehigh's long-standing partnership with IES Abroad, and reflects the growing collaboration between the Office of International Affairs and Lehigh's College of Health to expand study abroad tracks for health students. Through these opportunities, students build cultural competency and professional skills in global settings while engaging with communities around the world.

### Fellowship Advising

Lehigh's Office of Fellowship Advising (OFA) works with university students, faculty, staff, and alumni to prepare nationally competitive scholarship and fellowship applications. A total of \$2.3 million in awards have been given through OFA's efforts since 2016, and 106 Lehigh students, faculty, and alumni have won nationally-competitive scholarships since spring 2017.

Bill Hunter, Director of Fellowship Advising and U.N. Programs, worked closely with Verma to help organize his time on campus as a Distinguished Fellow.



### Maida Education Abroad Grants

Studying and interning abroad is transformative for many students, and Lehigh is committed to ensuring that all students have access to this opportunity.

To that end, Lehigh was excited to announce the establishment of the Maida Education Abroad Grants, an initiative to make global education opportunities more accessible to students with high financial need.

This \$2 million endowment from Sharon and James Maida '85 '17P '19P through the James and Sharon Maida Foundation, Inc., will enable more Lehigh students to study, intern, research, or engage in service abroad. The Maida gift also supports the Lee lacocca Institute for Global Leadership by contributing to matching funds from the lacocca Family Foundation, directly connecting the new grants with the university's leadership development mission.

The grants will create a seamless pathway for students. It starts with Lehigh's established Passport for Success program, which introduces first-generation, high-need, and underrepresented students to high-impact educational opportunities. Students who complete Passport to Success will then be eligible to apply for a Maida Education Abroad Grant.

"The Maida Grants will help us create a pivotal connection among our programs that will encourage students to engage in international learning experiences throughout their time at Lehigh," said Cheryl Matherly, Vice President & Vice Provost for International Affairs at Lehigh.

"It's important to Sharon and me that every student has the opportunity to learn about the world through international education. We were inspired to create this endowment after talking with Dr. Henry Odi about the Passport to Success program. And we structured it in such a way that the Iacocca Family Foundation will match the gift."

### Collaborative Online International Learning




Lehigh's Rudy Shankar partnered with Uruguay's University of the Republic to create a COIL (Collaborative Online International Learning) course on sustainable energy, one of several COIL collaborations developed across Lehigh in recent years. COIL pairs courses from different coun-

tries, enabling students to work together on collaborative assignments, projects, and discussions. Supported by Lehigh's Virtual International Exchange (VIE) Community of Practice—run jointly by OIA and the LTS Center for Innovation in Teaching and Learning—this initiative reflects Lehigh's growing emphasis on innovative, technology-enabled global learning that builds cross-cultural understanding and professional skills.

### International Education Week

At Lehigh, IEW highlights the university's commitment to expanding scholarships, mentorship programs, and inclusive pathways that make global experiences accessible to all students. The week's events included a campus flag parade, Friendsgiving dinner, and the Together We Climb awards luncheon, which honored more than 30 faculty, staff, and organizations for supporting Lehigh's international community.





### Strengthening Global Ties Through International Partnerships

Lehigh's global partnerships continue to grow in scope and impact, connecting faculty, students, and staff with leading institutions worldwide. In 2024–25, Lehigh maintained active agreements with universities and organizations across Asia, Europe, Africa, and the Americas, advancing shared goals in research, teaching, and student mobility. ### Expanding Innovation and Exchange with TU Dortmund

Lehigh University and TU Dortmund have sustained one of Lehigh's **longest-running international partnerships** since 1998, rooted in shared regional strengths and a focus on innovation. In 2024, a Lehigh delegation visited Dortmund for sessions on entrepreneurship, economic development, and future collaboration with academic, government, and industry leaders.

The partnership also advanced joint research on entrepreneurial well-being, led by Willy Das (pictured, right) of the Lehigh@NasdaqCenter and Daniela Gimenez Jimenez (pictured, left), Junior Professor of Entrepreneurship at TU Dortmund and visiting research professor at Lehigh through a UA Ruhr grant. They **explored sustainable approaches** to supporting entrepreneurs' mental, physical, and emotional health—redefining success to include well-being alongside business outcomes.

### LU/UN Partnership Celebrates 20th Anniversary

In August 2004, Lehigh became just the sixth university in the world to attain non-governmental organization (NGO) accreditation from the United Nations, and the Lehigh University/United Nations (LU/UN) Partnership was born. In 2024, LU/UN <u>celebrated its 20th anniversary</u> with a year-long offering of events, special guests, and U.N. visits.

The LU/UN Partnership provides opportunities for all Lehigh students, faculty, and staff to gain skills necessary to become successful global future makers by engaging with the U.N. via curricular and co-curricular initiatives. ### Ukrainian Ambassador visits Lehigh

In the midst of one of the most important periods in the modern history of his country, Ukrainian Ambassador to the UN Sergiy Kyslytsya <u>visited Lehigh</u> on September 4, 2024. He discussed the Russia-Ukraine War, the nature of diplomacy, and the importance of global engagement. Addressing a packed auditorium, Sergiy Kyslytsya offered a candid assessment of the U.N.'s limitations in addressing the war and affirming the critical importance of continuing diplomatic engagement. While acknowledging frustrations with the system, he warned against abandoning it without a viable alternative.

### 2024-25 LU/UN Partnership Highlights

### Students Reflect on Global Injustice



Thirty Lehigh students attended the UN's International Day of Remembrance of the Victims of Slavery and the Transatlantic Slave Trade on March 25, 2025. They heard from global leaders, including the U.N. Secretary-General and a Nobel Laureate, and left inspired to raise their voices for meaningful change.

### Presenting on Global Gender Issues



At the U.N. Commission on the Status of Women conference on March 21, 2025, 25 Lehigh students **presented research** and policy recommendations on gender equality. Their work addressed education gaps, social innovation, and global equity, highlighting Lehigh's role in advancing women's rights worldwide.

### Dialogue with Global Leaders



On April 2, 2025, Lehigh students engaged directly with Catherine Russell, UNICEF's Executive Director, and British Ambassador James Kariuki near the UN. Discussions on UNICEF's funding challenges and U.N. Security Council reform gave attendees valuable insight into today's pressing global issues.

### **Greening Diplomacy in Action**



Lehigh students **guided** the Permanent Missions of Germany and the Netherlands through the certification process for the Partnership for Sustainable U.N. Missions. The two delegations became the fifth and sixth certified, joining others in adopting eco-friendly practices aligned with the U.N.'s Greening the Blue agenda.

### **Empowering Rural Sustainable Change**



Students <u>welcomed</u> Binod Anand, Secretary-General of the Confederation of NGOs of Rural India, for a keynote on sustainable rural development. Anand shared strategies for cooperative economics and innovation in agriculture, urging students to "win over yourself" and seek practical ways to drive global change.

Lehigh University has been granted special consultative status with the U.N.'s Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC), expanding its reach and influence on global policy. This designation allows additional representatives to attend and present at U.N. conferences—including the General Assembly for the first time—placing Lehigh alongside NGOs like Amnesty International and Greenpeace. Building on a 20-year U.N. partnership, this status gives students and faculty unprecedented opportunities to engage directly in international dialogue and decision-making.

### Lehigh in India Virtual Hub

The first Indian student enrolled at Lehigh University in 1956. Today, India is the third-largest country of origin for Lehigh international undergraduate students, and the second-largest for graduate students.

With significant growth in student populations and faculty with degrees from Indian institutions, OIA has established a new virtual hub to strengthen Lehigh's **engagement to India**, with an emphasis on Indian student recruitment, academic partnerships, and research collaborations.

Lehigh has launched new graduate pathway programs with <u>Vellore Institute of Technology</u> (VIT) and <u>SRM</u> <u>University</u> in India to strengthen pipelines for international students. These programs give students early exposure to research opportunities at Lehigh, preparing them to contribute to advanced projects in engineering, health, and other disciplines.

The initiative is already showing promising enrollment growth and is expanding Lehigh's connections with two of India's leading universities.



Lehigh hosted an March 2025 event for admitted students in Mumbai, which was attended by Cheryl Matherly, Vice President & Vice Provost for International Affairs; Manoj K. Malhotra, Dean of the College of Business; Parv Venkitasubramaniam, Professor of Electrical & Computer Engineering; and Vinita Desai, Lehigh's in-country representative in India.

### Connecting with Future Leaders in Mumbai

In June 2024, Lehigh <u>hosted</u> the inaugural Building Futures Workshop in Mumbai, designed to strengthen undergraduate recruitment and build the university's brand in India. The event brought together college counselors and rising high school seniors from across the country, introducing them to Lehigh's academic opportunities while engaging them in activities that developed entrepreneurial, innovative, and problem-solving skills. The workshop—organized by Lehigh's Office of Admissions with support from OIA—reinforced Lehigh's long-term commitment to expanding its visibility and partnerships in India.

### Representatives Strengthens Lehigh and India Ties

For two years, Vinita Desai has served as Lehigh's in-country representative in India, promoting recruitment and partnerships nationwide. During her <u>first campus visit</u> in February 2025, she met with leaders across all five colleges and described Lehigh as a "very unique" and welcoming community for international students.

### Global Engagement and Internationalization Award Winner



Fathima Wakeel, Associate Professor of Community and Population Health

Fathima was honored for her leadership in the Mothers of Sierra Leone project, a Global Social Impact Fellowship initiative she co-leads with Michael Kramp, Professor of English.

Using documentary filmmaking and research to address maternal and child health, the project guides students in investigating maternal mortality, collaborating with Sierra Leonean communities, and highlighting innovative local healthcare solutions. This advances Lehigh's mission of global teaching, research, and service.

"What I really love about this project is using filmmaking as a tool not only to shed light on the maternal health crisis, but also to highlight the innovative solutions emerging in Sierra Leone to address the maternal mortality crisis," Fathima said.

The Global Engagement and Internationalization Award honors faculty who have made exemplary contributions to the internationalization of Lehigh University, while advancing the university's mission of excellent teaching, research and service.


### Faculty Internationalization Grants Winners

Three Lehigh faculty members were awarded 2024-25 Faculty Internationalization Grants, which support projects that expand international research, teaching, and collaboration.

**Dork Sahagian**, Professor of Earth and Environmental Sciences, received a \$5,000 grant to support a 3-week faculty visit to Armenia, building academic and research partnerships in environmental studies.

**Edward Whitley**, Professor of English, received a \$5,000 grant to collaborate with TU Dortmund University on digital humanities exhibits highlighting 19th-century New York literary culture.

Christina Chi Zhang, Assistant Professor of Art and Architecture, received a \$3,660 grant to participate in the Young Humanitarian Summit in Zürich, presenting an exhibition and engaging in global discussions on post-war healing and humanitarian responses.



# Lehigh's Growing Role in Central Asia



Lehigh is deepening its engagement in Central Asia through new partnerships and expanded academic collaborations in Kazakhstan and beyond. In fall 2024, Vice President and Vice Provost for International Affairs Cheryl Matherly and Director of Global Partnerships and Strategic Initiatives Stacy Burger traveled to Almaty and Astana to meet with leaders from Satbayev University, Nazarbayev University, and Astana IT University, building connections that support joint research and student exchange.

Lehigh also played a central role in the inaugural meeting of the Kazakhstan-U.S. University Consortium (KUUC), a collaborative initiative sponsored by the Institute of International Education that links 36 U.S. institutions and 31 Kazakh universities. The consortium is designed to promote research collaboration, curriculum innovation, and academic mobility. In addition, Lehigh supports the Central Asian Researchers Network (CARN), a Creative Inquiry initiative hosted on LinkedIn that brings together scholars from Kazakhstan, Uzbekistan, and the wider region. Collectively, these efforts highlight Lehigh's commitment to international partnerships, global learning, and sustainable impact.

### Thai Scholarship Program Builds Global Ties

This longstanding success has fostered a strong alumni network in Thailand and strengthened Lehigh's reputation as a valued partner. In January 2025, Cheryl Matherly and Stephen DeWeerth, Dean of the P.C. Rossin College of Engineering and Applied Science, visited Thailand to meet with program officials and host a network dinner with more than 30 Lehigh alumni.

Alumni continue to promote the university to new generations of scholars, build bridges for international collaboration, and reinforce Lehigh's place as a destination of choice for Royal Thai scholars, advancing shared goals in science, research, and global engagement.

### OIA and College of Health Partnership



Lehigh's Office of International Affairs and the College of Health continue to collaborate on initiatives that advance the college's mission to prepare leaders, address the growing needs of the health sector, and improve lives worldwide. The partnership focuses on global experiential learning, integrating international perspectives into the curriculum, and advancing research connections through Lehigh's ties to the United Nations and World Health Organization.

Angelina Rodríguez, Assistant Vice Provost for Global Learning, holds a joint teaching appointment with COH, where she develops courses on global learning and well-being while helping guide capstone projects. In addition, Krista Liguori, Teaching Assistant Professor of Community and Population Health, was appointed jointly by OIA and COH to expand global experiential education. She develops internships and courses in global health, strengthens connections with the UN and WHO, and represents Lehigh in international forums. These efforts deepen Lehigh's capacity to engage globally while enriching the student experience.

### InspireHer Founder Talks Health Access





Sandra Boakye, a Lehigh PhD student in Population Health and founder of the nonprofit InspireHer in Ghana, delivered a **compelling global health talk** during International Education Week in November 2024. Boakye is an alumnus of the **Mandela Washington Fellowship** program hosted at Lehigh.

Drawing on her work combating menstrual inequity, she highlighted drone technology's transformative role in delivering medical supplies—vaccines, blood, and essentials—to remote communities in Ghana. Boakye emphasized how innovations like drones can overcome logistical barriers and significantly improve rural health outcomes, especially for women and girls.

"I think that it is important, especially as women, for us to empower ourselves academically and to be able to contribute to the communities, to be able to make the meaningful impact that we want. I want to encourage young leaders everywhere to invest in building themselves up while they're doing the work."
