About Education Abroad

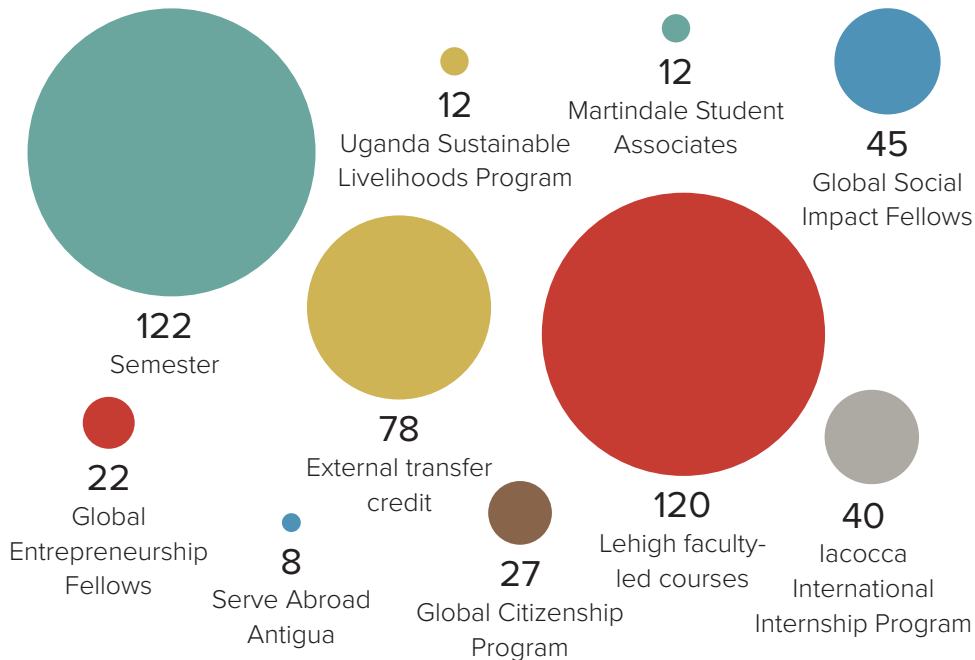
The Office of International Affairs (OIA) offers a large variety of education abroad experiences, including study abroad, the Global Citizenship Program and the Iacocca International Internship Program.

The Study Abroad Office supports all international outbound programs on campus, providing guidance on program design and review; offering grants to students; assisting with marketing, recruitment and student eligibility review; and overseeing risk management, including health and safety protocol. OIA staff are on-call to support students as needs arise due to travel, health, security or other issues.

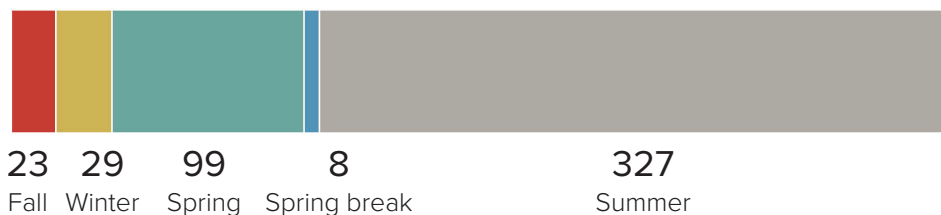

This report highlights education abroad from fall 2021 through summer 2022.

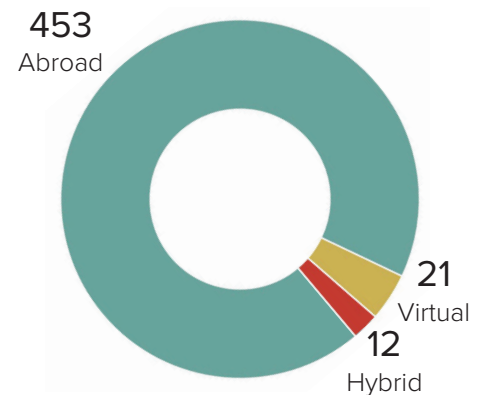
Student Experiences by Type

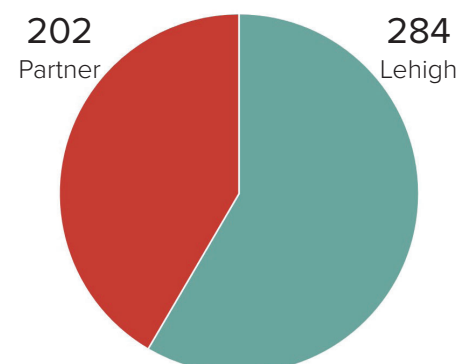

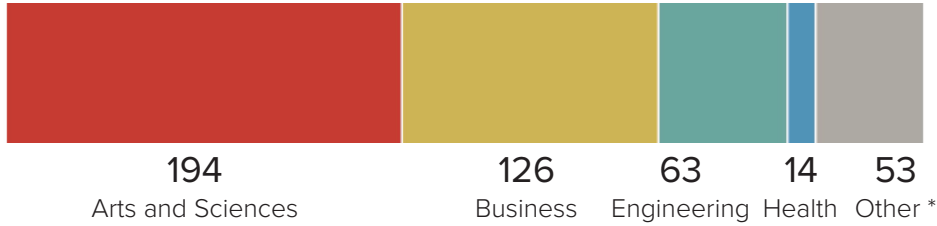

Experiences by Provider



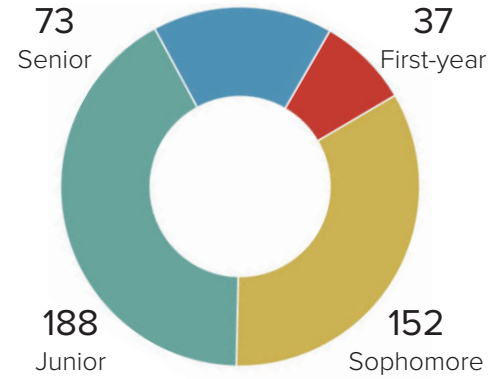

Participants by College

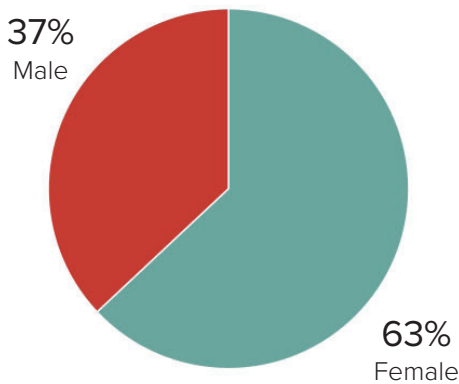

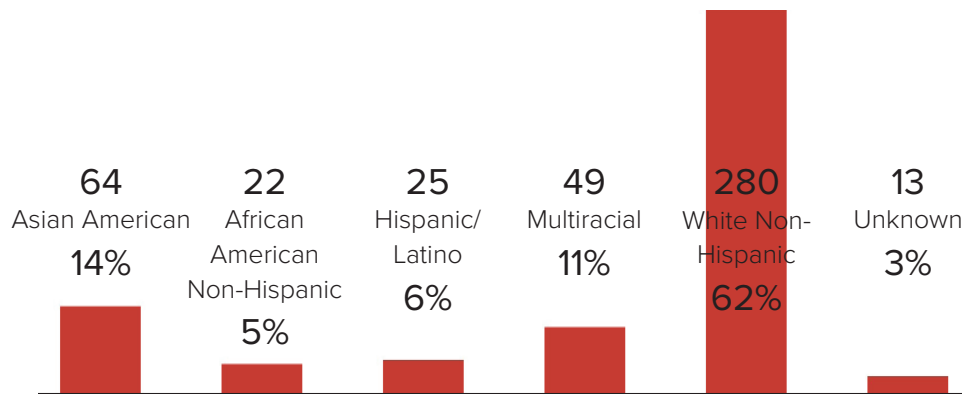
Participants by Year



Participants by Sex

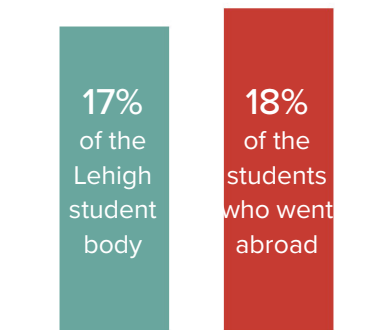


Participants by Ethnicity

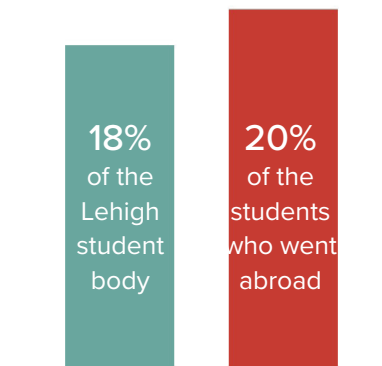

Passport to Success

45 students
56 experiences

45 of the students who went abroad in 2021-2022 completed Passport to Success, a one-year mentorship program that connects first-generation and low-income students with high-impact learning practices such as study abroad. Together, they completed 56 international experiences.

Both first-generation students and students who received Pell Grants were over-represented among the students who went abroad relative to their shares of the overall undergraduate student body. Pell Grants are awarded to undergraduates with exceptionally high financial need.
