





Lehigh launches new Global Engagement Directory

Lehigh University has launched a new Global Engagement Directory, an interactive digital platform showcasing the university's international partnerships and global activity.

Designed to support Lehigh's global engagement strategy, the user-friendly directory features a searchable map of institutional collaborations, sortable by country, partnership type, and college or department. It also includes spotlight pages for nearly two dozen countries—such as China, India, France, Japan, the UK, and Zimbabwe—highlighting how Lehigh faculty and staff are engaged around the world.

"This tool enables us to tell our story, highlight our global connections, and reinforce our leadership in international engagement and innovation," said Cheryl Matherly, Vice President and Vice Provost for International Affairs. The directory reflects Lehigh's commitment to internationalization and positions the university at the forefront of global higher education innovation.

2024-2025 PARTNERSHIP Highlights



University of Naples Federico II *Italy*

A partnership with the University of Naples Federico II is advancing fusion science and training the next generation of researchers. Led by Eugenio Schuster, Professor of Mechanical Engineering & Mechanics at Lehigh, the collaboration explores new plasma control systems while engaging graduate students through joint lectures, seminars, and mentoring. The initiative positions Lehigh at the forefront of international research on sustainable energy.



Technical University Bergakademie Freiberg Germany

Through its partnership with TU Freiberg, Lehigh is pioneering circular carbon technologies to tackle urgent climate challenges. Led by Carlos Romero, Director of Lehigh's Energy Research Center, the collaboration advances solutions for carbon capture and recycling while strengthening international research ties. This work supports global efforts toward sustainable energy systems.


African Center for Governance and Economic Management

Lehigh placed its first international intern in Africa through a new partnership with the African Center for Governance and Economic Management (ACGEM) in Ghana, marking a milestone in expanding the university's global footprint.

The internship gave a Lehigh student hands-on experience contributing to ACGEM's mission of economic research and policy development. The placement was organized in collaboration with the Martindale Center for the Study of Private Enterprise and facilitated by Martindale Executive Director Todd Watkins, Study Abroad Director Katie Radande, and Scott Koerwer, Executive Director of the Lee Iacocca Institute for Global Leadership.

This partnership underscores Lehigh's growing commitment to experiential learning and cross-continental collaboration, while laying the groundwork for deeper institutional ties in Africa.









New Graduate Pathways Strengthen Lehigh's Ties to India

Lehigh has launched new graduate pathway programs with Vellore Institute of Technology (VIT) and SRM University in India to strengthen pipelines for international students. These programs give students early exposure to research opportunities at Lehigh, preparing them to contribute to advanced projects in engineering, health, and other disciplines. The initiative is already showing promising enrollment growth and is expanding Lehigh's connections with two of India's leading universities.

2024-2025 PARTNERSHIP Highlights



Transatlantic Ruhr Fellowship Germany

In summer 2024, Lehigh hosted 12 top students from the three UA Ruhr universities* in Germany through the Transatlantic Ruhr Fellowship, strengthening a flagship transatlantic partnership. The fellows gained cross-cultural and professional experience through leadership workshops and New York-area internships, supported by faculty and staff across the Lee Iacocca Institute for Global Leadership, International Center for Academic and Professional English (ICAPE), and the Office of Global Education. The program underscores Lehigh's role as a hub for international collaboration and student development.

Agastya International Foundation India

Lehigh deepened its partnership with India's Agastya International Foundation in 2025 by sending five student-faculty teams for joint fieldwork through the Global Social Impact Fellowship. Their projects addressed AI in STEAM education, climate change learning centers, and design thinking in classrooms, giving students real-world experience in innovation-focused learning. Agastya's mission to reach 100 million children by 2032 aligns with Lehigh's values of experiential education, global engagement, and cross-campus collaboration.

2024-2025 FACULTY & STAFF Highlights



Dimitrios VavylonisProfessor of Physics

Dimitrios Vavylonis led Lehigh's partnership with the Nagoya Institute of Technology (NiTECH) in Japan. He led the first group of Iacocca International interns to NiTECH in 2016, and is leading his sixth team this year. A total of 26 students have participated. Since 2022, Lehigh has also welcomed NiTECH students into research labs across several departments. An official exchange agreement was signed in 2020 and renewed in 2025. In addition to his work with Japan, Vavylonis coorganizes an international biophysics summer school at the University of Crete in Greece, demonstrating his broader commitment to global academic exchange.





Katy Rene & Vincent Munley

Lehigh's research placement program in Galway, Ireland, was revitalized through the collaborative efforts of Katy Rene, Assistant Director of Study Abroad, and Vincent Munley, Professor Emeritus of Economics in the College of Business. After a decline in faculty participation abroad, Munley traveled to Ireland in spring 2024 to personally reconnect with academic contacts, advocating for Lehigh students as valuable research assistants. His outreach helped restore faculty participation numbers to pre-COVID levels. Working in tandem, Rene coordinated the placement process, ensuring strong student-faculty matches. Their joint efforts reflect the impact of faculty and staff collaboration in expanding global opportunities and strengthening Lehigh's long-standing partnerships in Ireland.

SENIOR LEADER DELEGATION Visits

High-level institutional visits by Lehigh senior leaders are an essential part of sustaining and expanding global partnerships. During the 2024–25 academic year, delegations led by Vice President & Vice Provost for International Affairs Cheryl Matherly and academic deans advanced collaborations across Asia and Central Asia, reinforcing Lehigh's visibility with key institutions, securing new partners, and opening pathways for research, teaching, and student mobility.

Singapore and Thailand (January 2025):

Cheryl Matherly and Stephen DeWeerth, Dean of the P.C. Rossin College of Engineering and Applied Science, visited the Singapore University of Technology and Design (SUTD), building on existing collaborations in engineering and design. The delegation also explored new opportunities for partnership in Thailand connected to Lehigh's upcoming participation in the IAPP Thailand 2025 program.

India (March 2025):

Matherly and Lehigh College of Business Dean Manoj Malhotra visited multiple partner institutions in India, combining relationship-building with student yield and alumni events. These activities strengthened Lehigh's academic ties in one of the university's most important international markets.

Kazakhstan (September & October 2024):

Cheryl Matherly and Stacy Burger joined the inaugural Kazakhstan-U.S. University Consortium, connecting 60+ institutions. The delegation reinforced ties with Almaty Management University, established a partnership with SDU, and met with leading universities and scholarship organizations in Almaty and Astana, advancing Lehigh's strategic engagement in Central Asia.

Japan (August 2025):

Matherly visited Nagoya Institute of Technology, meeting with senior leadership, faculty, and students to meet with students completing summer research internships through the Iacocca International Internship Program. They also explored ways to expand collaborations for student and research programs. This partnership was first launched by Lehigh's Office of Creative Inquiry.



2024-2025 PARTNERSHIP Highlights

Technical University of Dortmund Germany

Lehigh University and TU Dortmund have maintained one of Lehigh's longest-standing global partnerships since 1998, built on shared regional characteristics and common priorities in innovation and economic development.

In December 2024, a Lehigh delegation visited TU Dortmund to deepen this collaboration through a series of sessions focused on entrepreneurship, innovation, and international partnership. A highlight of the visit was a roundtable discussion exploring how universities, government agencies, and industry leaders can jointly foster startup ecosystems and drive economic growth.

Delegates also participated in workshops to assess recent joint projects, address shared challenges, and identify new opportunities for cooperation. This long-running partnership continues to exemplify the value of sustained international engagement, showing how universities can connect with external stakeholders to advance innovation and regional development on both sides of the Atlantic.

Also this year, Daniela Gimenez Jimenez, Junior Professor of Entrepreneurship at TU Dortmund, collaborated with Willy Das, Senior Research Scientist at Lehigh@NasdaqCenter, on a study developing solutions to support the well-being of entrepreneurs. Their work was featured in Fortune magazine. Additionally, students from TU Dortmund's TLab visited Lehigh in March to participate in Technical Entrepreneurship Week.
